Kids dance, sing to learn an Australian culture

Pine Bluffs Elementary students were treated to some Aboriginal wisdom Thursday night.

Paul Taylor, Australian story teller, helped the kids

understand the Australian Aboriginal language and lessons through songs, dance and stories. Even though Taylor himself is not Aboriginal, his teacher of 20 years, Yidumduma Bill Harney, is a senior Aboriginal Elder of the Yubulyawan clan of the Wardaman people.

Taylor told the students Australia was the last country to be colonized and Aborigine is the one of the oldest living culture heritages in the world. In the Aborigine community, the grandparents teach the kids about the "dream time," using metaphors to teach the kids how to take care of their

country including the plants and animals.

According to Taylor, the Aborigines use a term called "Bush University." Bush is another name for forest. In Bush University, the people, the animals and the earth have a job to do.

Taylor showed the kids a few horn instruments from Australia, and led the kids in dances and songs he played. He also showed the kids how to do a "bush call." The bush call is used by those who are lost in the forest to let other people know where they are. It is also used to gather people in the village.

When the kids gathered around in the elementary gym, Taylor started singing a "Paying Attention" song, and the kids sang along. Then, Taylor played a didgeridoo, a long wooden tube traditionally made from a hollow branch, while the kids sang.

Taylor explained Aborigine kids are taught to pay attention to the plants, birds, animals, insects and everything in the natural world. For example, they pay attention to the cockatoo, which is called Yak Yak because that's the sounds it makes when giving a signal to pay attention. Cockatoos "yak yak" when they see dangerous animals, and so the Yak Yak's job is to warn others.

Taylor also taught the kids a song, story and dance about the Kookaburra bird. In the story, the Sun Lady powders her face with red okra and the red color sprinkles over the clouds and hills in the east. This is the sunrise. The Kookaburra laughs because the sunrise is so beautiful, and it lets people know it is time to start the day.

The Sun Lady then lights her fire stick, jumps into the sky and walks over the earth. In the middle of the day, she stops and has lunch. Taylor said this is why the middle of the day is the hottest.

She continues her journey to the west, where she puts on her makeup again. The Kookaburra laughs because the sunset is so pretty, and it tells people the day is over.

The Sun Lady slips underground and puts her fire out. She goes back to the east when everyone is asleep. Taylor said just like the heart is always beating, the Sun Lady is always walking.

Taylor also did an Emu dance, which teaches kids to be gentle to the earth. Then, he did a kangaroo dance. The Kangaroo is four-legged when he's eating, but can also be two-legged. The kangaroo always pays attention. Taylor said when people see the

Winter in Wyoming - wow, what a time for a long road trip

A lonely bald eagle near Kaycee, a long pile-up of semi-trailer trucks on Interstate 80 near Rock Springs, dry roads all around Rawlins and high winds between Douglas and Wheatland.

These were just a few of the adventures during a recent road trip around the state.

It started on the last day of the most beautiful autumn most of us have ever experienced in Wyoming. On Sunday, Nov. 9, I listened to the Bronco game while heading over South Pass to Rock Springs to stay ahead of a big snowstorm bearing down on Lander. The Rock Springs chamber asked me to talk during their annual monthly luncheon and it made sense to drive over the night before. During my talk, a blizzard hit Sweetwater County with a vengeance.

Our next stop was a talk to the Geo Wives in Casper and, again, it did not make any sense to go over South Pass through Lander since that area got 8 inches of snow and

winds were blasting the pass.

On Interstate 80 on our way out of Rock Springs, there were four semi-trailer trucks smashed into each other, followed by a mile of stalled vehicles, followed by three more smashed trucks, followed by another mile of stalled vehicles and then more smashed trucks. This thing stretched eight miles. Sure glad all I was doing was fighting black ice in my eastbound lane.

We were able to go about 30 mph for 30 miles and I thought we might end up in Rawlins for the night, but the roads cleared and off we went at the official 80 mph speed limit.

In Casper, we stayed at the newly remodeled Ramkota Inn and, wow that is quite a facelift. Compliments to Renee Penton Jones and Karin East onsite and Dave Sweet and the rest of the Ramkota crowd for investing serious money in a Wyoming facility.

Casper was the coldest place in North America at negative 27 so we stayed there an extra day!

Then it was on to Cheyenne. We chatted with Tom

Saunders at Converse County Bank in Douglas and found out the boom in his town is real.

He told how the RV parks are full of oil field workers and even the State Fairgrounds was at capacity with the trailers. When the fair came around, the city and county worked out an arrangement where all the RVs could be moved for that big week and then could move back when the fair was over. Good planning. He said 15 big oil rigs were working around the area. Helga Bull and Patty Morrell at the chamber echoed the same story.

In Wheatland, growth is more modest. LeVay "Blinkie" Byers, who operates the Interstate Gas Shell Station, said they have "steady" activity but are missing the boom happening to Douglas to the north and Cheyenne to the south.

In Cheyenne, the annual Wyoming Business Forum put on by Bill Schilling and his excellent crew was great.

Then we were anxious to get home. It took just four hours to get from Cheyenne to Lander on dry highways. That included stops in Laramie and

Rawlins. Amazing what that official 80 mph speed limit can provide if you drive safely and just keep on going.

Then it was off to Sheridan Sunday for a fund-raiser at Kim Love's Frackelton's Restaurant. Again, we left a day early (a sign of my cautious old age), and encountered black ice and one huge ghostly buck deer crossing Interstate 25 just north of Buffalo.

Picked up the latest copy of the Durant Courant, the official Longmire newspaper at the Buffalo Bulletin office. I imagine there has been an "extra" printed announcing the fourth season of the popular TV show coming back.

Back in Sheridan, Love said the economy is "humming." The town looks prosperous. Old friends Karen and Torrey Moody at the Mill Inn put us in the "honeymoon" suite, which included a red heart-

shaped Jacuzzi tub. Hmm. I honestly think it has been 48 years between our stays in honeymoon suites.

Saw local phenom photographer Tim Doolin in Sheridan. Understand he recently created and donated proceeds from a calendar of his photos to benefit a sick friend. Nice guy.

While driving around Sheridan, we saw a trainload of jet passenger plane fuselages go by - amazing.

We rolled back into Lander Tuesday, Nov. 18. Whew, nine days of winter weather driving was completed . . . at least until the next Wyoming book tour.

A funeral service will be Friday at 2 p.m. in Lakeview Chapel at Schrader Funeral Home, with burial at Cheyenne Memorial Gardens.

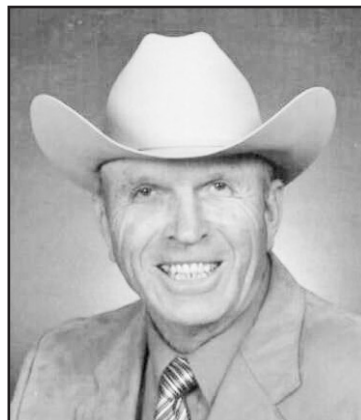

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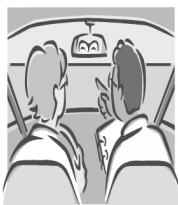

kangaroo, it reminds them of a story of the dream time.

In the "dream time," the two-legged animals had a fight with the four-legged animals. The only one who wasn't fighting was the kangaroo. The kangaroo started singing the Pay Attention song so the animals would stop fighting. The kangaroo told everyone they needed to treat each other like family because everyone is family. This teaches kids to spend time with their family.

Taylor also played a lagerphone, a long stick with many battle caps attached to it. When Taylor hit the stick on the ground, the caps jingled. He taught the kids a dance to go along with the music.

At one point, Taylor put a school uniform on and told the kids about the schools in Australia. Taylor said all students, whether in private or public school, wear uniforms.

To finish the show, Taylor showed the kids the different types of boomerangs. The first one was a long, wooden

boomerang. It can be used for digging, cooking on and hunting. This boomerang does not return when thrown. However, Taylor did show the kids a boomerang that does return to the thrower. It's smaller, lighter and is shaped like a 90 degree angle. This boomerang is used for fun. He explained to the kids how the boomerang flies in the air, and demonstrated other boomerangs to show the different spins, distance, speeds and wing type.

Taylor is from Adelaide, South Australia and lives in Laramie. He was brought to America by Bobby Bridger on an invitation to perform as a "mountain man" in Bridger's company version of "Ballad of the West." Taylor also attended the Jackson Hole Centennial Rendezvous.

"Storytelling is a powerful way of teaching," Taylor said. "I do the stories and songs together. Then I add some dance and I have a painting in the background. When I put it all together, it is theatre."

Burns Elementary School's pajama party celebration

Burns Elementary school celebrated their Adequate Yearly Progress results with a pajama party and movie Friday.

Jerry Burkett, Principal, said the third- through six-graders who took the PAWS test in March were 100 percent proficient or advanced. Using the No Child Left Behind system, schools are measured each year by AYP calculations. AYP is a federal measurement that allows the United States Department of Education to determine how schools and districts are performing academically.

The school had scored low the last two years. Burkett

said by using Safe Harbor, the school made great gains. In order to make Safe Harbor, the school needed to have at least a 10 percent decrease in the number of non-proficient students from the previous year.

Students were able to progress from basic to proficient. Burkett said the students and teachers worked very hard. Students worked on inferencing in reading or how to read between the lines. Burkett said PAWS testing is very heavy on this skill, and the teachers had to be very deliberate with what they taught the students.

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Two Hornets compete in top six at culinary contest

Two Pine Bluffs Hornets were one of six teams to show off their breakfast creations in the final round of the Taco John's Culinary Cup competition.

Taco John's sent out information about the Culinary Cup competition to all the high schools around Wyoming. This year, 66 recipes were submitted. The top six recipes competed to be in the Taco John's menu for a limited time.

On Wednesday, Madison Heithoff and Chris Kimzey, Seniors at Pine Bluffs Jr./Sr. High School, had the opportunity to cook in the Taco John's test kitchen in Cheyenne. Heithoff and Kimzey created a Churro breakfast sandwich.

"It was pretty exciting," Kimzey said.

"It was pretty unexpected," Heithoff said.

When the team arrived at the test kitchen, they went to orientation and received chef

coats with their names on them, along with a backpack full of goodies for the day. Heithoff and Kimzey were the second team to present. The teams had an hour and a half to cook, present the entree in a way it could be served in a drive-thru and then answer questions from the judges. The judges for this year's Culinary Cup were Natalie Thompson, Johnson and Wales University; Ted Stoner, Stoner Consulting; Shawn Eby, Vice President for Operations at Taco John's International and Bob Karisny, Vice President for Menu Strategy and Innovation at Taco John's.

"It was exciting to shake hands with the president of Taco John's and meet other professionals in the culinary industry," Kimzey said.

Chefs who cook in the test kitchen helped the team, since the team was unfamiliar with the kitchen. Heithoff said the team had no idea where anything was. She said the cooks pointed them in the right direction.

"When we arrived, the team

before us was finishing up. They were on top of things and knew where everything was at that point. Seeing them know where the tools were was a bit intimidating," Heithoff said.

"The chefs were very helpful while we were there. They were very friendly and willing to help us out," Kimzey said. "It was fun to work in the kitchen with their head chef. The whole experience overall was awesome."

Heithoff said the team was really nervous to present in front of the judges. However, the judges were really nice and the team had nothing to worry about. Heithoff said her favorite part was going in front of the judges and talking about the creation.

At 4:30 p.m., the winners were announced. The French Toast Burrito, made by Rachael Wright and Shayna Hodge of Riverton High School, received second place. Each member received a \$250 scholarship. The Cheerful Breakfast Chalupa, made by Sierra Huston, Patrick White and Sydney Montoya of Cheyenne East High

School, won the competition. Each team member received a \$500 scholarship.

Nicole Horrocks, Pine Bluffs High School Family Consumer Science teacher, said she was at the competition to support her students and get them to where they needed to be.

"I was their chauffeur," Horrocks said. "We were able to tour the first Taco John's ever built and play with the new Coke Freestyle Machine, the first one in Wyoming."

During the competition, Horrocks could sit and watch, but couldn't say anything. This was one of her biggest struggles throughout the whole process. Heithoff said she would ask Horrocks for her help or opinion. Horrocks said she could only say 'I can't say anything'.

Horrocks had her ProStart class make a breakfast entree. She said she thought it would be a good opportunity for the students to use their creativity and culinary skills. The students were able to make their creations in the ProStart kitchen at the high school. Once the entrees were com-

pleted, the teams submitted a picture along with the recipe.

"I've never seen students work together as well as they did with this contest. They were all motivated and interested," Horrocks said.

The judges said Heithoff and Kimzey worked well together. Heithoff said she felt like an overbearing older sister. When she was told she had to make breakfast, Heithoff said her original thought was to make something sweet, because that's what she would want.

The team first thought of a bacon stuffed churro dipped in spicy chocolate. The team found out it wasn't as good as it sounded. Heithoff said even though the first entree was no good, they still kept the churro idea. They played with the idea and came up with making it a burrito. They added bacon, sausage, cheese and eggs.

"We ended up with something pretty tasty," Heithoff said.

"I'm so proud of them. They did an outstanding job. I knew they had something when they created the churro.

I thought it was so unique," Horrocks said. "It was a real pleasure to be a part of the process and I would like to continue this next year."

Heitoff said the best part about creating the entree was being able to eat it. Kimzey agreed. However, there was a lot of trial and error.

Heitoff said they kept making the size of the churro bigger and had trouble cooking the churro all the way through without burning it.

"We didn't expect anything to come out of it," Heitoff said. "We went through the steps and ended up making something pretty cool."

"Students submitted 66 recipes this year. They were all very good. It was very difficult

narrowing the field down to the six teams who will compete for the championship," Karisny said. "These young chefs and their teachers should feel very proud they've made the finals. This is their state championship."

"It's an honor received for not just me, but for everyone involved. It's a notch for the whole district."

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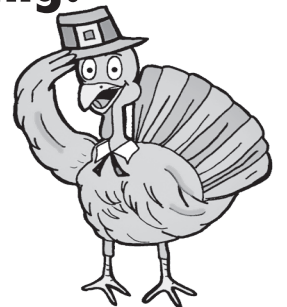

Talk with your insurance agent or visit the [HealthCare.gov](http://www.HealthCare.gov) website to learn about the offered services and to compare insurance plans and rates. Remember: only licensed insurance agents can advise you on what plan is best for you.

If you are insured through an employer, consider the following before selecting a coverage plan this year:

- Look closely for changes. Don't automatically renew the option you had before; many employers are making changes.
- Take advantage of wellness incentives: Learn whether your employer offers a wellness program including cost-saving incentives for healthy behaviors such as exercising regularly or not smoking.
- Check out tax-free savings: In addition to your health insurance coverage, you may be eligible to open a Flexible Spending Account (FSA) or a health savings account (HSA).

If you are self-employed or if your employer doesn't offer coverage, you face unique challenges in finding and keeping health insurance, but you still have choices.

- Spouse's plan: Look into joining your spouse's or domestic partner's employer plan.
- Individual insurance: Consider purchasing private insurance. This option allows you to customize coverage to your lifestyle, health, and budget.

If you are unemployed, you have already determined how to continue your coverage. Now is a good time to review your decision. Stewards Recognized For Outstanding Natural Resources Management

Top stewards have been recognized for their continuing efforts in three areas by the South Platte Natural Resources District.

Sprenger Farms of Sidney, Steve Schumacher from Dalton and Kimball area ranchers Doug and Theresa Keller received awards for their farming, tree planting and grassland achievements. The awards were presented at a ceremony and reception prior to the District's November board meeting.

Conservation Farm
Sprenger Farms, run by Randy and son Marc Sprenger has a long history of land stewardship and conservation ethic. Their continuing whole-

farm practices earned them the 2014 Conservation Farm Award.

The family's efforts go clear back to planting grass on 36 acres and installing 14,726 feet of terraces in 1970 (as far back as NRCS records show practice installation). While those practices were installed by a previous generation, the Sprengers were recognized in part because of their continued maintenance of the practices, plus adding new practices to further enhance the entire farm conservation plan.

As part of their overall conservation practices, the Sprengers have initiated and maintained rangeland improvements including livestock water development and crossfencing to improve a rotational grazing system. While the family currently

rents out their grassland, they still do everything possible to assure its health and have implemented a rangeland monitoring system to gauge their success.

Pivot pressure reduction and is a part of irrigation water management, as is the art of crop rotation to keep ground water conservation in mind. Irrigated fields might be split or rotated to small grain uses to make sure their water supply remains viable.

Implementing no-till methods since 2011, the father-son team uses nutrient management efforts through soil sampling and tissue testing, and have made improvements to their sprayer to reduce pesticide and herbicide drift.

Randy and Marc have quietly made a huge impact on the landscape in Southwestern

Cheyenne County that will leave a lasting legacy, just as Randy's parents and grandparents did.

The Sprenger's award was sponsored by Potter State Bank.

Tree Planter/Caretaker
Every year since 1993 Steve Schumacher has been addressing conservation needs on his farm with conservation trees. More than 38,000 trees and shrubs have been planted on his farms, including two farmstead windbreaks, one wildlife habitat and seven field windbreak systems totaling more than 100 acres.

The windbreak systems are extremely valuable in Northern Cheyenne County as the soils in that area are sandy loam soils and are very prone to wind erosion. Schumacher started practicing no-till and

has learned that the snow trapped by his windbreaks resulting in moisture is even more valuable in his no-till operation than the previous conventional farming operations.

Schumacher positions field windbreaks to provide the most benefit to the land. By locating the trees perpendicular to the prevailing winds soil erosion is reduced significantly especially with the fine, sand, loam soils in his area. A few of his plantings were planted right in the spot where the most highly erodible soils were problematic.

Schumacher believes in tree/shrub diversity and incorporates many different varieties. He has not missed a year in replants as he knows

The remaining volumetric capacity of this facility is estimated to be 13 million cubic yards of solid waste. The remaining life of the facility is estimated to be 133 years.

The Department of Environmental Quality, Solid and Hazardous Waste Division (Department) has reviewed the lifetime renewal permit application and determined that it is generally complete and suitable for publication. SWRR Chapter 1, Section 2 (b) (ii), requires that the applicant must provide public notice that a proposed permit has been issued and inform the public that there is an opportunity to file comments on the proposed permit before it is issued in

final form. The notice is also required to indicate that the public may file formal written objections to issuance of a final permit. This publication provides notice of those opportunities.

17 Casey Palma, Steil Surveying, presented a Subdivision Permit and Plat for Horse Creek Ranch (The) Second Filing, located in Horse Creek Ranch (The), Tracts 18 & 19, Laramie County, Wyoming (Situated between Doc Holliday Loop and Butch Cassidy Trail). June Casey Samuelson, owner of Thursday, November 20, 2014 Page 3 of 7

property, gave a background on this property and the request. Ms. Samuelson said she is withdrawing the request to divide Tract 19 but wishes the request for a lot size variance to provide adequate access to Tract 18 go forward. Barbara Kloth, County Planning, presented the staff report and recommended approval with the following condition: 1) The plat shall be revised to only include the boundary line adjustment as shown between Tracts 18 & 19 of the original plat, and exclude the further lot split, prior to recordation. Chairman Humphrey opened the hearing for PUBLIC COMMENT. Carol Lamirand, 3855 Butch Cassidy Trail, asked if a new land owner could split the property. Hearing no further public comment, Chairman Humphrey closed the PUBLIC HEARING. Commissioner Thompson moved to approve the Subdivision Permit and Plat for Horse Creek Ranch (The) Second Filing with condition 1, and adopt the finding of

facts a, b, and c of the staff report. Commissioner Ash seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

18 Scott Johnson presented an Administrative Appeal regarding a temporary use permit for Tract 4, Mountain View Homes Subdivision located on Southwest Drive. Mr. Johnson provided documentation to the Board and the original PUD was for mini storage units in his property which is surrounded by business uses. He never intended to have permanent outside storage of recreational vehicles, boats, etc. However, he wants to operate a U-Haul rental business which the surrounding landowners do not object to. Brian Walker, Planning Manager, presented the background of the PUD and request and stated that storage of U-Haul trailers and trucks is specifically a prohibited use. The Planning Department has worked closely with Mr. Johnson and has suggested the applicant amend his PUD which the applicant is in the process of doing. A temporary use permit is being requested to allow the U-Haul rental business to operate without mini storage units in place for customers to place their stored items. 20 Commissioner Thompson recommended the following representatives of the various user groups to the Laramie County Water Appropriation Committee: Board of Realtors, Lisa Tabke and Max Minnick; South Cheyenne Community Development Authority, Leslie Meade and Bonnie Reider; Southeast Wyoming Home Builders Association, Bill Edwards and Joe Patterson; Laramie County Conservation District, Jim Cochran and Brian Lovett; Wyoming Stock Growers, Dan Frank Bill Bonham; Irrigation Ag Community, Jim Lerwick and Greg Gross; Small Municipalities, Mayor Bill Shain and Mayor Judy Johnstone; Economic Development, Dale Steenbergen and Randy Bruns; City of Cheyenne, Mike Sullivan and Mayor Rick Kaysen; Board of Public Utilities, Tim Wilson and Jim Murphy; City/County Environmental Health, Gary Hickman; Industry, Scott Horgen and Lars Story from Dyno Nobel and Dennis Ellis from Anadarko; Governor's Office Nephi Cole who will also name two representatives of Academia. His recommendation would be to approve the initial list and then add others who may have volunteered. Commissioner Holmes moved to approve the list as presented. Commissioner Ash seconded the motion. Commissioner Hasenauer asked to add a group of independent home builders and private property owners. Commissioner Thompson restated that the intent of the motion was to approve the list as presented and then come back and address additions after that. Commissioner Hasenauer moved to appoint Bill Bonham. Commissioners Holmes and Thompson pointed out that Mr. Bonham has already been appointed as a representative of the stock growers. Commissioner Hasenauer withdrew his motion. Commissioner Hasenauer moved to appoint Brad Harrington. The motion died for lack of a second. Commissioner Hasenauer moved to appoint Mike Tuttle. The motion died for lack of a second. Commissioner Hasenauer moved to appoint Leonard Mosher. The motion died for lack of a second. Commissioner Ash recommended holding two seats that could be filled at a later time. Commissioner Humphrey relayed a story about Jim Willadsen and a lake on his property. Commissioner Holmes moved to appoint Brenda Johnson as an alternate to Scott Zimmerman.

Commissioner Ash seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of four in favor and one opposed with Commissioner Hasenauer casting the dissenting vote. Commissioner Hasenauer moved to appoint Jim Hastings as an alternate to Tom Taylor. Commissioner Thompson seconded the motion, which passed unanimously. Commissioner Ash moved to cease appointments. Commissioner Holmes seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of four in favor and one opposed with Commissioner Hasenauer casting the dissenting vote.

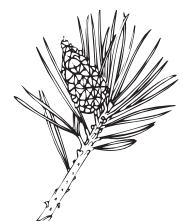

a windbreak is only as effective as the tree survival. Over the last twenty years he has hand planted more than 21,000 trees/shrubs to replace those that did not survive.

In 1997 Steve participated with the NRD and Nebraska Game and Parks Commission in establishing a Wildlife Habitat Program planting in his pasture. This planting provides great "edge" for wildlife. Once again several shrub varieties were planted to enhance the food source for wildlife.

As a good neighbor, he has helped plant trees for others and always is promoting and talking about benefits of trees and shrubs. He has been heard talking about the yield increase with winter wheat in fields protected by his windbreaks.

Schumacher is also active in the

Dalton area and has been a basketball coach for their local team.

Grassland Manager

Doug and Theresa Keller own and operate a registered Angus herd west of Kimball. Their operations consist of approximately three section of grassland along with some irrigation to complement their livestock operation.

Over the last several years, the Kellers have used EQIP and NSWCP cost share dollars to improve their grassland health with a grazing plan that included adding additional water storage supplies, extensive crossfencing, and converting dry land crop acres to cool season pasture mixtures to improve early season grazing for their cow/calf operation. They have

installed more than four miles of fence, including more than 4,100 feet of cross fence. They have installed seven tanks and more than 7,000 feet of pipeline to supply pastures.

Other improvements include converting center pivot crop acres to an irrigation pasture to enhance the production of the irrigation acres and also the production and profitability of the livestock operation. In 2005 they converted a half circle into grass pasture with six paddocks for rotational grazing.

The Kellers utilize the cool season grasses and native pasture in their rotational grazing system to improve overall pasture health. They feel grass as their crop is the best use of the land in their operation.

The Kellers not only are concerned

about grassland health, but also the use of windbreaks to benefit livestock and wildlife. They added several thousand trees for protection around their center pivots and also the newly seeded pasture to improve protection and add beauty to their operation.

All of that work, the Kellers say, is for the future... primarily the future of their children, three of whom remain at home and learn life's lessons while showing cattle and developing their own plans.

The Kellers have been active in the community as well, with Theresa serving on the Kimball school board and Doug as a past member of the Extension board.

Their award was sponsored by Frenchman Valley Coop of Kimball.



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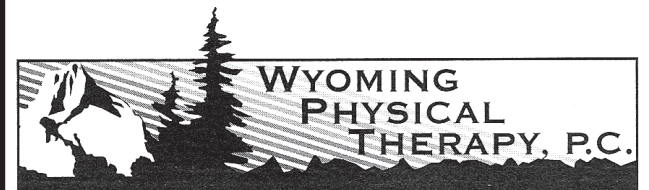
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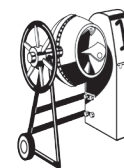
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
